#### **GENERAL COMMUNICATIONS**

There were no general communications.

#### **QUARTERLY INVESTMENT REPORT**

District Investment Advisors Dave Ivarie, of Morgan Stanley, and Mike Urner, of Wells Fargo Advisors, LLC., distributed and reviewed the quarterly report of the WKCCD General Obligation Bond Portfolio and Facilities Reserve for the quarter ending December 30, 2017 (copies attached to the official minutes). Mr. Urner reported that the GO Bond Portfolio gained income of \$29,197.59 for the quarter with an ending value of \$3,945,098.79. The projected 12-month portfolio coupon income is \$69,568.00 with \$5,078,405.49 total income earned since inception. Mr. Urner reviewed the asset and credit sector allocation and the portfolio maturity distribution, as well as confirming continuing compliance with state code and regulations. He reminded the Board that this investment is projected for a short duration as the funds will be completely consumed by the current Measure A projects.

Mr. Urner reviewed the highlights of the Facilities Reserve including income for the quarter of \$50,805.24 and an ending value of \$9,963,703.28. He also noted the projected 12-month portfolio coupon income of \$292,597.00 and \$4,856,532.47 total income earned since inception. Mr. Ivarie reviewed the asset and credit sector allocation and the portfolio maturity distribution, as well as confirming continuing compliance with state code and regulations. While this portfolio had a difficult fourth quarter, the year was still successful. The market is remaining steady despite the rise in interest rates.

#### **Trustee Reports**

Trustee White reported that he attended the town hall for the Strategic Action Plan. He was pleased with the process and participation from staff in the update of the plan.

#### **Academic Senate**

Geoffrey Dyer, President of the Academic Senate (AS), reported current AS activity including new adjunct members, and discussion of the CCAP agreement included on tonight's agenda. Discussion concluded the Applied Technology division wished to continue the CCAP and efforts to increase enrollment are underway. The initial CCAP agreement timing affected the recruitment for the first year. The AS reviewed the Strategic Planning Committee charter, held elections for AS representations, approved a resolution to apply to join the Online Education Initiative Consortium and approved a new Dual Enrollment Committee charter.

Discussion was held to clarify the TUHS involvement on the Dual Enrollment Committee. Mr. Dyer expressed a need for the TUHS representation to provide input though the voting rights belong to AS members.

#### **Associated Student Organization**

Kayla Meyer, Student Trustee, reported that the first Clery Act workshop was help with guest speaker Casey Harris discussing sexual violence. The ASO is currently celebrating Valentines week with lunch activities and is also honoring Black History awareness month with the annual Taste of Soul at the end of February. ASO has begun to hold focus group meetings to gather campus-based

feedback and is already seeing changes made to meet needs of students due to interaction from students and staff at the first meeting.

#### **Foundation**

Sheri Horn-Bunk, TC Foundation Director, told the Board that Foundation welcomed Javier Reyes to the staff. The Foundation is working with the family of Stan Hutchison, who was a Cal Berkeley engineering graduate, to promote engineering from at the College campus. There will be a recruiting day for TC and TUHS students to meet with Cal Berkeley staff. There is also a STEM event being planned for May 11th, more information will follow.

#### **Student Success**

Primavera Arvizu, Dean of Student Success, stated that the Student Resource Center has been visited by students 105 times in the first week of the semester. The donation run center is serving students in need on campus. The equity webpage is up and the student catalog is in the process of being updated. Recruiting efforts are ongoing with high school visits and summer Cougar Days in planning. A group will be attending a Guided Pathways workshop this month.

#### **Business Services**

Amanda Bauer, Director of Fiscal Services, told the Board that the process to prepare a preliminary budget is underway with the deadline of presenting the final product in June. The Governor released the new funding formula and the District is in the process of determining the effects of the formula. The new formula is split between Full Time Equivalent (FTE) students, student need rate, and student success indicators.

#### **Human Resources**

Julie McNeil, Interim Associated Vice President of Human Resources, reported thate the department is currently involved in several recruitments. One recruitment process is to fill the Executive Director of Human Resources position. The search has been extended to increase the candidate pool.

#### **Institutional Research & Planning**

Oleg Bespalov, Executive Director of Institutional Research & Planning, reported that the campus held a town hall for the Strategic Action Plan. With participation at the meeting, IR staff was able to gather input to meet the specific needs of the College in the updated plan. The IR office is also processing the Annual Program Reviews (APR). The APR process is improving and will show improvement from the ACCJC recommendation that was shared with the College during the last accreditation.

#### **Taft College Faculty Association**

Diane Jones, President of the Faculty Association, spoke in appreciation of the support for a possible bond. She stated that the facilities are greatly improved to serve students from the Measure A bond and she is optimistic about the possibilities to continue to improve the learning environment at the College. Ms. Jones noted that the Dental Hygiene preliminary remarks from the Dental Hygiene Commission of California (DHCC) are positive news for the College. She also noted that mathematics faculty are working to comply with AB 705 which states students can only start two levels below transfer.

#### **Facilities**

Mike Capela, Director of Maintenance and Operations, provided an update on projects around the campus. The Student Center steel frame is currently being erected, giving visibility to the project. A potential solar project is in the researching phase. A SPURR contractor will be presenting project options to the Board in March. Mr. Capela also reported that a job walk for the Proposition 39 energy efficiency project in the library was held. The project will be completed at night and will include interior and exterior lighting updates.

#### **Information Services**

Andrew Prestage, Director of Information Services, reported that the department is hosting a system review of the use of Ellucian/Banner on campus. The study results are expected in May.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

#### **Energy Technology & Welding**

Dr. Daniels has attended advisory groups for both programs. Support from the industry is strong and the development process for goals and objectives is underway.

#### Oil Academy Steering Committee

Dr. Daniels attended the Taft Union High School Oil Academy Steering Committee as an industry/community partner of the program. As dual enrollment issues are often discussed at this committee, it is important to remain active and participate in the critical discussions.

#### West Kern Adult Education Network

Dr. Daniels is now a member of the West Kern Adult Education Network (WKAEN). WKAEN manages courses for the GED, career technical education and English as a Second Language (ESL) needs of the community. She stated that being an active member in WKAEN will bridge the programs, assisting students in the ability to become Taft College students as they further their educational endeavors. It will also allow the program and the College to share resources.

#### **DHCC** Review

The Dental Hygiene program was visited by the Dental Hygiene Commission of California (DHCC) as a site review of necessary required changes to approve the program to continue to offer services and education. Comments from the site team were positive and official determination from DHCC will occur in April. The Dental Hygiene program was approved by the DHCC to offer continuing education courses, which will also help to bring in revenue.

#### Other

Dr. Daniels has attended the Associated Student Organization meeting this month as well as the City of Taft Council meetings. Last week there was a productive Strategic Action Plan town hall held. She also reported that recruiting efforts to fill the vacant Vice President of Instruction position are underway.

#### **NEXT MEETING**

The next monthly meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 14, 2018, at 5:00 p.m.

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN WEST KERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AND CALIFORNIA SCHOOL EMPLOYEES ASSOCIATION, CHAPTER #543

(AB 119 ON-BOARDING PROCESS)

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into by the WEST KERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT ("District") and the CALIFORNIA SCHOOL EMPLOYEES ASSOCIATION, CHAPTER #543 ("Association"). The District and Association are collectively referred to as "the Parties." The Association enters into this MOU on its own behalf as well as on behalf of classified bargaining unit employees represented by the Association as Exclusive Representative.

This MOU is in regard to requirements imposed on the Parties by the passage of AB 119 with regard to the on-boarding process for newly-hired employees (also referred to as "new employee orientation"). Upon execution of this MOU, the duty to meet and negotiate regarding the matters set forth in this MOU has been satisfied.

#### **TERMS**

The Association and District agree as follows:

1. Notice of New Employee Orientation: In accordance with Government Code Section 3556 the District will provide the Association with 10-days' advance notice of new employee orientation for bargaining unit employees. Under certain circumstances, a shorter period may be appropriate. The notice will be emailed to the Chapter President (with a copy to the CSEA Labor Rep) and include the new hire's name, hire date, position and work site.

#### 2. Employee Information:

New Unit Employees: To the extent required by Government Code Section 3558 the District will provide the Association with contact information for each newly-hired bargaining unit employee on a monthly basis. The contact information will be sent in an Excel spreadsheet to CSEA via an email address to be provided by CSEA. The required information will be provided regardless of whether a new employee was previously employed by the District.

<u>Required Contact Information:</u> Name, job title, department, work location, work, home, and personal cellular telephone numbers, personal email address on file with the District, and home address.

<u>Periodic Update of Contact Information:</u> To the extent required by Government Code Section 3558, the District will provide the Association with contact information for bargaining unit positions on the last working day of September, January and May. The contact information will be sent in an Excel spreadsheet to CSEA via an email address to be provided by CSEA. The District will provide the Required Contact Information in its possession.

<u>Exceptions:</u> The District will provide required information in its possession, subject to Government Code Sections 6207 and 6254.3.

#### 3. Structure, Time, and Manner of New Employee Orientations:

"New employee orientation" means the on-boarding process for newly-hired bargaining unit employees as set forth in Government Code Section 3555.5 (b) (3).

If the District schedules a new employee orientation meeting during the school year for newly hired unit members, the Chapter President, or designee, will be given up to 30 minutes to meet with the new hires. If a group meeting is not scheduled, the Chapter President, or designee, will be allotted 15 minutes to meet with the new hire within 30 days of hire. The orientation session will be held on District property during the workday of the new hire(s) who will be on paid time. The CSEA Labor Rep may also attend the orientation session.

District administrators, supervisors, and human resource personnel will not be present during the Association's allocated time.

CSEA Membership material (including an internet link for an electronic application) will be provided to the District. The District will provide the CSEA Membership material to the new-hire.

#### 4. Duration of the MOU:

This MOU is effective as of the latest date of approval and signature and shall remain in full force and effect through June 30, 2020. The MOU shall automatically renew from year to year, unless reopened in writing by either party no later than June 1 of any year.

In the event a successor MOU is not achieved within 60 days of the demand to negotiate, either party may invoke the interest arbitration provisions in Government Code Section 3557.

#### 5. Savings Clause:

If during the term of this Agreement there exists any applicable law, rule, regulation or order issued by governmental authority other than the District, which shall render invalid or restrain compliance with or enforcement of any provision contained within this Agreement, it shall not invalidate any unaffected remaining portion(s). The remaining portion(s) shall continue in full force and effect. Upon written notification by one of the Parties to the other, any portion of the Agreement that is invalidated in accordance with this Article shall be opened for negotiations within thirty (30) days of the invalidation.

#### TENTATIVE AGREEMENT

By affixing their signatures to this MOU, the District and the Association acknowledge that the matters set forth above are fully settled, This MOU shall be binding upon their heirs, successors, devisees, administrators, employees, executors, and assigns of the parties hereto. This MOU will be effective upon acceptance by CSEA and subsequent approval by the Board of Trustees.

This tentative agreement ("Agreement") is made by and between the Taft College Faculty Association ("TCFA/CTA/NEA") and the West Kern Community College District ("District") (collectively referenced as the "parties") with respect to the following recitals:

As part of continuing dialogue through the Taft College Faculty Collective Bargaining Committee, the parties have reached a consensus regarding Faculty/Adjunct Faculty employee data and new employee orientations (AB 119).

Now, therefore, TCFA/CTA/NEA and the District hereby agree as follows:

- 1. The above recitals are true and correct.
- 2. The parties agree, effective July 1, 2017, that Section 5.12, Faculty/Adjunct Faculty Employee Data and New Employee Orientations, of the collective bargaining agreement ("CBA") shall be modified as follows:
- 5.12 <u>Faculty/Adjunct Faculty Employee Data and New Employee Orientations</u> (Contract section added to comply with AB 119 effective 7/1/17)

The Human Resources department will provide the Faculty Association President and Vice-president an electronic file via email containing all bargaining unit employee information for the current academic year (employee name, job title, department, work location, home phone number, personal cell phone number, personal email address, and home address) by September 1, February 1 and May 1 of each year. The information will be separated out into two categories, one containing full time faculty members and one containing adjunct faculty members.

The Office of Instruction shall provide the Faculty Association President and Vice-president at least ten days advance notice via email of all new employee (faculty or adjunct faculty) orientations. If the ten day advance notice is not feasible due to extenuating circumstances, the notification will be sent as soon as possible prior to the orientation. The Faculty Association President or designee will attend the orientation. The Office of Instruction will schedule orientations during normal business hours. The Office of Instruction and the Human Resources department will include information provided by the Association in all packets of information given to new employees (faculty or adjunct faculty.)

- 3. Except as set forth in this Agreement, all other terms and conditions of the CBA shall remain unchanged.
- 4. This Agreement will become effective after ratification by the TCFA/CTA/NEA members and the District's Governing Board.

#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING REGARDING THE EFFECTS OF MARCH 31, 2018 LAYOFF OF DENTAL HYGIENE SPECIAL PROJECTS POSITION

WHEREAS, the West Kern Community College District ("District") and the California School Employees Association and its Chapter 543 (collectively, "CSEA"), agree to this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") regarding the effects of the March 31, 2018 Layoff of Dental Hygiene Special Projects Position (the "Layoff"):

- 1. Employees subject to layoff or a reduction in work hours/work year shall retain all rights and benefits guaranteed to them by the California Education Code section 88017 and the effective collective bargaining agreement ("CBA") between the District and CSEA;
- 2. The order of layoff and displacement rights shall be in accordance with the California Education Code section 88127 and the CSEA CBA;
- 3. When requested, the District shall provide classified bargaining unit members affected by the Layoff with letters of reference to verify the affected employees' job titles, dates of employment, and final salary level earned;
- 4. Benefited employees who are subject to layoff or a reduction in hours which results in the loss of health benefits shall be offered COBRA upon the loss of health benefits. Current Health & Welfare benefits will run through May 31, 2018;
- 5. Employees who have been laid off and placed on a reemployment list may be employed as a substitute or short term employee in any class for which they are qualified and such employment shall in no way affect her status or eligibility for reemployment;
- 6. The District will provide CSEA with a copy of all layoff notices concerning members in the classified bargaining unit. The District will provide CSEA with a final list of the placement (if bumping rights are exercised) of the affected bargaining unit members and all communications sent to affected bargaining unit members. The District will also provide CSEA with a current seniority list for all job classifications affected by the Layoff and a current reemployment list;
- 7. The District will notify bargaining unit members, who are placed on the reemployment list as a result of the Layoff, of their opportunity to update their contact information for purposes of receiving future communications regarding reemployment matters.
- 8. An employee on the 39-month reemployment list will be given five workdays to respond to an offer to return to work in a like-for-like position. If the District does not receive a response by the fourth workday, the exclusive representative be notified and will attempt to contact the employee. If there is no response by the close of business on the sixth workday, the offer will be considered to have been rejected. The rejection shall be considered as a resignation from the District and the employee shall be removed from the reemployment list. For purposes of this provision, like-for-like means the same job

- classification, the same or greater number of hours per week, and the same or greater number of months per school year;
- 9. If an employee on the 39-month rehire list accepts an assignment of fewer hours per week or fewer months per school year, the employee will be eligible for reinstatement to the position and hours from which she was laid off for an additional period of up to 24 months (California Education Code section 88117).

#### **Background:**

Taft Union High School (TUHS) has previously partnered with West Kern Community College District (WKCCD) Concurrent Enrollment and Articulation opportunities. Recent legislation provides options for strategically restricting enrollment when appropriate and simplifying apportionment concerns. The initial Career Technical Educational pathway was Welding courses, starting with WELD 1500 – Welding Processes and INTC 1000 – Career Readiness in Industrial Technology. We are requesting to continue these course offerings through this agreement.

The agreement for dual enrollment with TUHS is a zero cost course for students meeting eligibility. Zero cost for WKCCD.

#### West Kern Community College District / Taft Union High School District College and Career Access Pathways (CCAP) Agreement

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_(enter date agreement signed), between the WEST KERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT hereinafter called "WKCCD" and TAFT UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT, hereinafter called the "TUHSD"; and supersedes all previous contracts and shall be valid for a period not to exceed one year, and supersedes all previous education agreements. Specific agreement between Taft Union High School (TUHS) and Taft College (TC).

#### Taft College and Taft Union High School

WHEREAS TC and TUHS find it mutually beneficial to operate the courses indicated below within the TUHS boundaries to serve students identified by TUHS, each party shall agree to take on the following duties and responsibilities:

- 1. TC shall be responsible for:
  - a. Providing mutually agreed upon college-level courses at Taft Union High School (TUHS).
    - i. Fall 2018 WELD 1500
    - ii. Spring 2019 INTC 1000
  - b. Selecting the faculty member to teach the course(s).
  - c. Evaluating the faculty member teaching the course(s), as per the faculty member's union master agreement.
  - d. Providing student support services to ensure proper testing, advisement, and enrollment.
  - e. Maintaining liability/property insurance coverage consistent with TC's existing coverage and limits existing throughout TC.
  - f. Holding TUHS students enrolled in the course(s) accountable to the standards for the policies and procedures of TC.

- g. Providing student performance information to the student and TUHS upon request.
- h. Collecting and submitting attendance information to TUHS in the form and manner the faculty would collect such data for submission of Full Time Equivalent Student (FTES) information to the California Community College State Chancellor's Office.
- i. Submitting FTES to California Community College Chancellor's Office as authorized by statute.
- 2. TUHS shall be responsible for:
  - a. Providing an appropriate location and instructional space for the course(s).
  - b. Maintaining liability/property insurance coverage consistent with TUHS's existing coverage and limits existing throughout TUHSD.
  - c. Supplying the faculty with the ability to properly utilize TUHSD's facilities (appropriate keys, copying, and other support which the faculty identifies to ensure student success).
  - d. Holding TUHS students enrolled in the course(s) accountable to the standards for the policies and procedures of TUHSD.
- 3. Protocols required for College and Career Access Pathways (CCAP) partnerships (California Code of Regulations, Title 5, section 76004 [AB288 Holden]):
  - a. Total number of students to be served: 20
  - b. Total Full-Time Equivalent Students (FTES) expected to be claimed by WKCCD: 4
  - c. Scope & nature of the courses, including applicable programs of study:
    - Welding courses applied as required core courses for successful completion of Associate of Science in Welding Technology, a nontransferrable degree,
  - d. Course(s), location, time, capacity

- i. WELD 1500, K Building, 3 unit, TUHS, 1 section, 8/13/2018 12/21/2018, capacity 20.
- INTC 1000, K Building, 3 unit, TUHS, 1 sections, 1/17/2019-5/30/2019, capacity 20.
- e. TC will require each high school student to complete the college's Concurrent High School Student Permission Form (special admit form).
- f. A part-time student participating in this CCAP Partnership Agreement may enroll in up to a maximum of 15 units per term if all of the following circumstances are satisfied:
  - i. The units constitute no more than four community college courses per term.
  - ii. The units are part of an academic program that is part of a CCAP partnership agreement.
  - iii. The units are part of an academic program that is designed to award students both a high school diploma and an associate degree or a certificate or credential.
- g. <u>Information sharing:</u> Upon signatory authorization by the high school administrator, parent/guardian, and student this form provides consent for information sharing between TC and the TUHS to include the following: Any and all admissions, registration, and grade information. Form signatories agree to notification of Family Educational Rights of Privacy Act (FERPA) regulations and limitations.
- h. <u>Parental consent:</u> Upon signatory authorization by the high school student's parent/guardian parental consent for registration and enrollment in the designated TC courses is provided.
- i. <u>Ability to benefit:</u> High school students are deemed able to benefit from TC courses as determined by the recommendation of the designated high

- school administrator and/or standard TC instituted pre-requisite criteria.
- j. Facilities use: TUHS will provide adequate classroom space at its facilities, or other mutually agreed upon location to conduct the contemplated instruction and will do so without charge to TC or students. TUHS agrees to clean, maintain, and safeguard TUHS's premises. TUHS warrants that its facilities are safe and compliant with all applicable building, fire, and safety codes. Pursuant to the Williams Settlement, the TUHS Board of Trustees will pass a resolution before courses are held which exempts all campuses in the TUHS which will be used for courses under this agreement from the provisions of the Williams Settlement. The exemption form the Williams Settlement may be limited by the resolution to the time immediately before, immediately after and during the time courses are being held under the terms of this agreement.
- k. TUHS certifies that the direct education cost of the courses are not being fully funded through other sources.
- 1. TC certifies that it has not received full compensation for the direct education for the conduct of the course from other sources.
- m. TUHS agrees and acknowledges that all courses held under the terms of this CCAP Partnership Agreement may be restricted to students of TUHS and Buena Vista.
- n. TUHS agrees and acknowledges that WKCCD will claim apportionment for the students enrolled in courses under this agreement.
- o. TC certifies that no community college instructor teaching a course on a high school campus has been convicted of any sex offense as defined in Section 87010, or any controlled substance offense as defined in Section 87011.
- p. TC certifies that any community college instructor teaching a course at the partnering high school campus has not displaced or resulted in the termination of an existing high school teacher teaching the same course on that high school campus.

- q. TC certifies that a qualified high school teacher teaching a course offered for college credit at a high school campus has not displaced or resulted in the termination of an existing community college faculty member teaching the same course at the partnering community college campus.
- r. TC certifies that the college course(s) noted within this agreement do not reduce access to the same course offered at the partnering community college campus.
- s. TC certifies that the college course(s) noted within this agreement are not over enrolled.
- t. TC certifies that the offering of college course(s) noted within this agreement is consistent with the core mission of the community college pursuant to Section 66010.4 and that pupils participating in a CCAP partnership will not lead to enrollment displacement of otherwise eligible adults in the community college.
- u. TC certifies the community college district complies with local collective bargaining agreements and all state and federal reporting requirements regarding the qualifications of the teacher or faculty member teaching a CCAP partnership course offered for high school credit.
- v. TUHS certifies the community college complies with local collective bargaining agreements and all state and federal reporting requirements regarding the qualifications of the teacher or faculty member teaching a CCAP partnership course offered for high school credit.
- w. TC will be the employer of record for purposes of assignment monitoring and reporting to the county office of education.
- x. TC will assume reporting responsibilities pursuant to applicable federal teacher quality mandates.
- y. At no cost to TUHS, TC will provide supportive services of staff members who will facilitate coordination and cooperation between TC and TUHS. TC will provide TUHS personnel with reasonable assistance, direction and instruction in how to fulfill their responsibilities under this agreement,

including conducting appropriate student assessments, outreach/recruitment activities and the TC's application procedures.

# BP 4250 Probation, Dismissal and Readmission Reinstatement

#### Reference:

Education Code Section 70902(b)(3); Title 5, Sections 55030 - 55034

#### Probation

<u>Academic</u> – A student shall be placed on academic probation if he or she has attempted a minimum of 12 semester units of work and has an institutional cumulative grade point average of less than a "C" (2.0).

<u>Progress</u> – A student shall be placed on progress probation if he or she has enrolled in a total of at least 12 semester units and the percentage of all Taft College\_units in which the student has enrolled, for which entries of "W", "I", "NC" and "NP" were recorded reaches or exceeds fifty percent.

#### Continued Probation

Continued Academic Probation – This is the probationary status of a student who has earned an institutional cumulative grade point average of less than a "C" (2.0) for two consecutive semesters.

Continued Progress Probation – This is the probationary status of a student who has earned a grade of "W", "I", "NC" or "NP" in fifty percent or more of all units for two consecutive semesters.

#### Removal from Probation

<u>Appeal of Probation</u> – A student who is placed on probation may submit an appeal in accordance with procedures to be established by the Superintendent/President or designee.

<u>Academic Probation</u> – A student on academic probation shall be removed from probation when the student's accumulated grade point average is 2.0 or higher.

<u>Progress Probation</u> – A student on progress probation shall be removed from probation when the percentage of units in the categories of "W", "I", "NC" or "NP" drops below fifty percent.

#### Dismissal

<u>Academic Dismissal</u> – A student who is on academic probation shall be subject to dismissal if the student has earned an institutional cumulative grade point average of less than 2.00 1.75 in all units attempted in each of three (3) consecutive semesters.

BP 4250 - Probation, Dismissal and Reinstatement

<u>Progress Dismissal</u> – A student who is on progress probation shall be subject to dismissal if the <u>institutional</u> cumulative percentage of units in which the student has been enrolled for which entries of "W", "I", "NC" and "NP" are recorded in at least three (3) consecutive semesters reaches or exceeds fifty percent.

#### Appeal of Dismissal

A student who is subject to dismissal may submit a written appeal in compliance with administrative procedures. Dismissal may be postponed and the student continued on probation if the student has shown significant improvement in academic achievement or can provide evidence of extenuating circumstances. A student has a right to petition for a hearing if their appeal is denied.

#### Reinstatement

A student who has been dismissed may submit request readmission with a written petition for reinstatement after a lapse of one semester.

Reinstatement Readmission may be granted, denied or postponed according to criteria contained in administrative procedures. A student has a right to petition for a hearing if their petition is denied.

The Superintendent/President or designee shall develop procedures for the implementation of this policy that comply with the Title 5 requirements.

# **BP 5530 Student Rights and Grievances**

#### Reference:

Education Code Section 76224(a)
Title 9 Education Amendments of 1972
ACCJC Accreditation Eligibility Requirement 20;
ACCJC Accreditation Standard IV.D

The Superintendent/President shall establish procedures to provide a prompt and equitable means of resolving student grievances. These procedures shall be available to any student who reasonably believes a college decision or action has adversely affected his or her status, rights or privileges as a student. The procedure shall include, but not limited to, grievances regarding:

- 1. Sex discrimination as prohibited by Title IX of the Higher Education Amendments of 1972;
- 2. Course grades, to the extent permitted by Education Code Section 76224(a), which provides: "When grades are given for any course instruction taught in a community college district, the grade given to each student shall be the grade determined by the instructor of the course and the determination of the student's grade by the instructor, in the absence of mistake, fraud, bad faith, or incompetency, shall be final." "Mistake" may include, but is not limited to errors made by an instructor in calculating a student's grade and clerical errors.
- 3. The exercise of rights of free expression protected by state and federal constitutions and Education Code Section 76120.

This procedure does not apply to:

- 1. Student disciplinary actions, which are covered under separate Board policies and Administrative Procedures.
- 2. Police citations (i.e. tickets); complaints about citations must be directed to the County Courthouse in the same way as any traffic violation.

The Superintendent/President shall appoint an employee who shall assist students in seeking resolution by informal means. This person shall be called the Grievance Officer. The Superintendent/President, when

needed, establish a standing panel of 5 members of the college community, including 2 students, 2 faculty members and 1 administrator, from which one or more Grievance Hearing Committees may be appointed. The panel will be established with the advice and assistance of the Associated Students Organization and the Academic Senate, who shall each submit 2 names to the Superintendent/President for inclusion on the panel.

The decision of the Grievance Hearing Committee chair shall be final on all matters relating to the conduct of the hearing unless there is a vote of a majority of the other members of the panel to the contrary.

Any appeal relating to a Grievance Hearing Committee decision shall be made in writing to the Superintendent/President within **two (2)** days of the decision. The Superintendent/President's decision whether or not to grant a grievance hearing shall be final and not subject to further appeal.

# BP 7400 Travel

The Superintendent/President is authorized to attend conferences, meetings and other activities that are appropriate to the functions of the District.

The Superintendent/President shall establish procedures regarding the attendance of other employees at conferences, meetings or activities. The procedures shall include authorized expenses, advance of funds, and reimbursements.

All travel outside the United States must be approved in advance by the Board.

Government Code Section 11139.8 prohibits a state agency from requiring its employees, officers, or members to travel to, or approving a request for statefunded or sponsored travel to, any state that, after June 26, 2015 has eliminated protections against discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression.

#### Background:

Each year, residence hall and meal plan fees are reviewed, and student-housing comparisons are completed. The interest of Taft College is to remain an affordable college option for all students, and to adjust costs for dorms and meals each year as necessary. Compared to other California Community Colleges offering dorms and a meal plan, Taft College remains the cheapest; this helps to recruit TIL students, student athletes, and other traditional students to attend Taft College.

After reviewing the residence hall and meal plan costs, it is recommended to adjust fees for the 2018-2019 academic year as outlined below. Upon approval, adjustments will be reflected on the 2018-2019 fee schedule.

There are recommended dorm fee increases of \$32 per month and \$288 per year for the Ash Street Dorms and \$45 per month and \$495 per year increase for the TIL Dorms for 2018-2019. There is no dorm fee increase in the Wildcat Dorms at this time. There is a recommended meal fee increase of \$40 per month, equaling a \$340 per year increase for Ash Street and Cougar Dorm students, and \$420 increase for TIL Dorm students.

#### Criteria A. Appropriateness to Mission

#### 1. Program Goals and Objectives

#### Program Mission

The Associate of Science Engineering program is designed to provide local southern San Joaquin Valley students an additional career path and transfer opportunity to California schools. Students will develop and demonstrate the necessary academic, technical, analytical, and communication skills in preparation to transfer to a BS Engineering Program in the CSU education system. Special emphasis is placed on California State University - Bakersfield transfer requirements.

#### Program Goals

This program is designed to:

- Provide the necessary lower division courses including math, science, engineering and general education that will transfer successfully to CSU system institutions.
- Prepare students to be academically ready for the upper division course work for a BS engineering program and industry employment.
- Acquire, understand and apply initial engineering design, analysis and problem solving skills.
- Demonstrate necessary critical thinking and lab skills to prepare the students for upper division major courses and subsequent industry employment.
- Provide students several career alternatives as they seek their engineering education.

#### Program Objectives

The AS Engineering program has the following objectives that support the overall program goals and mission.

- Continue offering each required math, physics, chemistry and engineering courses at a minimum of once per school year.
- Provide three different tracks that apply to seven different engineering majors. Each track is designed to have the core classes that all engineering majors require as well as individual courses applied to specific areas of study. The three tracks are:



- a. Track One: BS Engineering Science, Mechanical, Aeronautical, Civil or Manufacturing Engineering
- b. Track Two: BS Electrical Engineering
- c. Track Three: BS Computer Engineering
- Integrate hands-on and project based learning into each engineering course emphasizing problem solving, critical thinking, teamwork and hands-on skills in addition to the basic theory understanding.
- Support community outreach efforts to attract local high school students (Taft Union, Maricopa and Shafter) and other Project Lead the Way (PLTW) or engineering related academy high schools in the Bakersfield area.
- Provide students the opportunity to explore an engineering career at the beginning of their educational experience and determine if "this is for me."
- Provide students alternative options if they determine that engineering is not their career choice.
- Link program with industry resources, enabling students to have role models
  of what an engineering career is and the economic value it provides. Create a
  sense for each student of.... "I want to become like him/her and I am capable
  of becoming an engineering through hard work and determination."
- Provide economic opportunities for students to understand college is affordable- i.e., summer work programs, internships and scholarships.

#### Program Level Outcomes

The program is designed to create the following outcomes:

- 1) Student demonstration of critical thinking, creativity and problem solving skills as individuals and as teams.
- 2) Demonstrate proper application of foundational engineering, math and science skills while solving current industry problems.
- 3) Make effective career choices in the engineering field.

#### Program Transfer Considerations

This program has been designed to meet the currently proposed Faculty Discipline Review Group (FDRG) Model Curriculum as submitted to the ICS in March 2015. The program has also been designed to meet the current 2016 - 2018 Catalog BS Engineering Science, BS Electrical Engineering and BS Computer Engineering programs so that students may transfer seamlessly into the school.

By following the proposed model curriculum, students will also be prepared to transfer into other CSU schools, for example Cal Poly SLO, Fresno State and Cal Poly Pomona and others.

#### 2. Catalog Description

#### Description

The engineering program is designed to provide the foundational courses for a student to successfully complete upper division course work to achieve a BS degree in one of seven engineering disciplines throughout the CSU system. Engineers utilize a variety of technical, mathematic, creativity, and problem solving skills to design, develop, produce, and optimize new products and manufacturing methods. This program starts the development of these skills and qualifies the student to transfer and earn one of the following degree types: BS Engineering Science, BS Mechanical, Aerospace, Civil or Manufacturing Engineering, BS Electrical Engineering or BS Computer Engineering.

Engineering degrees require intensive math, science, and engineering course curriculum. They are also considered "high unit majors" and may require additional semesters to complete all required course work. Preparations in high school including calculus, physics, chemistry and Project Lead the Way (PLTW) curriculum will minimize any additional course work load. Development of an educational plan with counseling and engineering faculty and meeting with a counselor each semester is strongly encouraged and highly recommended.
