Academic Senate

Candace Duron, Academic Senate President, said that Senate voted in support of the three faculty emeritus members on tonight's agenda. They have also submitted faculty hiring recommendations to the Superintendent/President and are preparing for the statewide Spring Plenary.

Marketing and Community Relations

Susan Groveman, Executive Director of Marketing and Community Relations, is working with several departments to coordinate the production of new student orientation videos to replaced aged videos. She has also continued work with the Accessibility Taskforce to promote training session and is converting old documents to meet accessibility standards.

Administrative Services

Mike Giacomini, Vice President of Administrative Services, has been working with campus stakeholders to prepare departments for budget planning. He noted that his area is preparing to recruit for the Bookstore Manager position due to Bill Norris' retirement. In the area of facilities, Mr. Giacomini reported that the

marquee on 6th Street and the Ash Street monument signs are nearing completion in conjunction with the Board goal addressing signage improvements.

Human Resources

Heather del Rosario, Vice President of Human Resources, recently attended a legal workshop with Dr. Minor. Staff in Human Resources are preparing the department's budget for 2025/26 and for summer/fall recruitment efforts. Ms. del Rosario is working with TIL management to plan professional development training for classified staff members.

Foundation

Dr. Sheri Horn-Bunk, Executive Director of Foundation and Institutional Advancement, announced over 100 candidates have applied to participate in the summer allied health intern program. She thanked her sponsors and industry partners for strong support of this program. On May 8th the Foundation will host an estate planning session with several community members already expressing an interest in attending. Dr. Horn-Bunk spoke on the passing of alum Vic Killingsworth, who is the College's oldest living alum.

Instruction

Dr. Sharyn Eveland spoke on behalf of Jaime Lopez, Dean of Instruction. She said that the annual Welding Event held March 28th was a success. There will be a CAPP summit for Taft College and educational partners. Planning is underway for that summit.

Lori Sundgren, Learning Center Director, reported that recruitment for fall tutors is underway. Staff are pleased to have a surplus of highly qualified candidates. She commended staff member Renae Ginther for her dedication to students. Ms. Ginther is currently taking a new math course to be better prepared to assist students.

Transition to Independent Living

Megan Romero, Director of TIL, announced that the TIL dorms and cohort for fall is full. There will be 16 students graduating this year.

Student Services

Cecilia Alvarado, Dean of Student Services, said that staff are excited to host Jefferson Elementary School's egg hunt tomorrow and will share College outreach items with the children. Staff are also hosting many Cougar Days for various schools and continue to expand the schools from Bakersfield that are attending. There is an adult learner recruitment effort underway and coordination between Outreach staff and EOPS/CalWORKs staff to provide resources to potential students. With graduation upon us, events for affinity groups as well as transfer students are being planned.

Amber Garcia, Financial Aid Director, thanked the Board for approval of the Nicholas Consulting agreement. She also shared that there are over 200 student applications for this year's scholarships. This spring Financial Aid has disbursed over \$1.2 million in resources. Financial Aid staff are participating in an EOPS advisory group to align efforts. The department is also in planning for a Dental Hygiene orientation event to better serve incoming students.

Lori Murphy, Athletics Secretary, said that teams are still being sought for the April 25th Al Baldock Golf Tournament.

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

Dr. Minor shared information on four student athletes recently honored by the Bakersfield Jockey Club. She also shared details of a TIL hosted tour and information event for Kern Regional Center staff to share services offered by the TIL program. In March, the Foundation honored Chevron. Chevron recently donated money that will support STEM areas, including providing STEM toys to the Child Development Center. The CTE staff and students were highlighted at an unveiling event for the College Seal designed as a Bookstore feature. Dr. Minor shared information on TIL student Gaige Mitchell's recent movie project and premiere. She also recognized the Foundation's award from the Women's and Girl's Fund that will provide \$20,000 to help ensure the success of the allied health intern program. Welding hosted another successful Open House event and again encouraged skilled competition while providing untrained attendees the opportunity to try welding firsthand. Early childhood education courses have been hosted by the College to help prepare area preschool and transition kindergarten educators for fall instruction in area schools. Dr. Minor also recognized the Associated Student Organization officers for their recent participation in the General Assembly at the Student Senate for California Community College annual conference.

Request for Approval: Taft College Educational Master Plan 2025-2035

Background:

With the assistance of the Collaborative Brain Trust consulting firm, in 2024 the District undertook the development of a 10-year Educational Master Plan. An educational master plan begins with an analysis of data about the college and the communities it serves. Data is used to project the growth potential for current and potential academic and student support programs.

The Educational Master Plan will help inform decision-making over the next 10 years, with periodic updates. The plan is now complete and ready for review by the Board of Trustees. A short presentation will be made to highlight the key components of the plan and its recommendations. Once approved by the Board of Trustees, the plan will be the foundation for planning activities at Taft College.

Dear Mr. Giacomini:

LSA is pleased to continue to support Taft College with agency coordination and field surveys for the 105-acre Hillard/Sunset parcel in Taft, Kern County, California. As noted in our review of the existing California Endangered Species Act (CESA) 2081 Incidental Take Permit (2081 ITP) for the property dated January 9, 2025 (Task 1 in the original proposal), coordination with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) and new field surveys are recommended to support Taft College's acquisition and future development of the parcel. Our Scope of Work below outlines these tasks.

SCOPE OF WORK

The following tasks are in addition to those outlined in our contract executed on December 20, 2024, under which Task 1 has been completed. Task 2 has not been used yet and is considered in estimating budget for coordination efforts described below.

Task 3. Record Search and Reconnaissance Survey

LSA will conduct an updated records search of the California Natural Diversity Database (CNDDB), the California Native Plant Society's Inventory of Rare and Endangered Plants of California, and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) Information for Planning and Conservation (IPaC) online system to identify special-status biological resources that have potential to occur within or adjacent to the 105-acre Project site. The results of the database searches will be field verified through combined pedestrian/windshield survey of the project site plus a 500-foot buffer, access permitting. The location of any special-status biological and aquatic resources detected, as well as all vegetation communities and other land cover types within the biological study area, will be mapped. We have assumed 68 hours of staff time for this task.

Based on a preliminary review of the project site, there does not appear to be any potential jurisdictional areas such as drainages or wetlands found on the project site. As such, a formal aquatic resources delineation is not included in this scope. If such features are detected during the field survey, LSA will determine if a formal delineation is required and will provide a separate proposal for that work.

Task 4. Biological Resources Assessment

The results of the database search and reconnaissance survey will be summarized in a Biological Resources Evaluation (BRE) report designed to comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The BRE will include a general description and map of the existing conditions including habitats on and adjacent to the 105-acre Project site, representative site photographs, figures depicting designated federal critical habitats and aquatic resources on and/or in the vicinity of the 105-acre Project site, and a discussion of any special-status biological or aquatic resources observed or with potential to occur within the direct and indirect disturbance limits of the 105-acre Project site. Project-related impacts to biological and aquatic resources will be evaluated in accordance with current CEQA Statute and Guidelines, and other relevant federal, State, and local regulations. As applicable, measures will be identified for avoidance, minimization, and/or mitigation of project impacts. We have assumed 80 hours of staff time for this task.

LSA recommends finalizing the BRE prior to completing the field surveys to move CEQA forward, as CEQA will be need to be completed before a 2081 ITP can be issued by the CDFW.

Task 5. Field Surveys

Based on the reconnaissance site visit, the following field surveys may be required. The specific surveys needed will be confirmed through consultation with the CDFW. Given that the original 2081 ITP included San Joaquin kit fox (*Vulpes macrotis mutica*) and antelope ground squirrel (*Ammospermophilus nelsoni*), it is anticipated that these species would be covered under a new 2081 ITP and surveys for these species are not included in this scope.

As requested, for each field survey subtask we are providing the hours of staff time for each of two scenarios: Scenario 1 for surveying the entire 105-acre parcel and Scenario 2 for surveying the 23-acre Phase 1 project area.

Task 5.1 Protocol Blunt-Nosed Leopard Lizard Surveys

Blunt-nosed leopard lizards (*Gambelia sila*) are categorized as Fully Protected species under State law. Fully protected species must be avoided as no "take" of the species is permitted. LSA will conduct protocol blunt nosed-leopard lizard (BNLL) using the CDFW's *Survey Methodology for the Blunt-Nose Leopard Lizard* (2019). This includes up to 12 surveys occurring between April 15 and July 15, and up to 5 additional surveys between August 15 and September 30. If at any point the species detected, the surveys will cease pending consultation with the CDFW. The results of the surveys will be summarized in a technical memorandum which will include methods, a map of the survey area with GPS locations of BNLL if found, photographs, and field data sheets. Please note that the protocol includes specific weather conditions under which the surveys must be conducted, which may necessitate additional field days. As such, we will track our budget for this task based on hours instead of survey days. Given that presence of BNLL on the 105-acre parcel could have substantial implications for future development, LSA recommends the entire parcel be surveyed, regardless of scenario. As such we have assumed 510 hours of staff time for this task

Task 5.2 Protocol Botanical Surveys

LSA's botanists will conduct up to three 2-day focused surveys for special-status plant species within the Project area. The surveys will be conducted according to the CDFW 2018 *Protocols for Surveying and Evaluating Impacts to Special Status Native Plant Populations and Sensitive Natural Communities*. The surveys will be floristic in nature and include areas of potential direct impacts plus a minimum 50-foot buffer, access permitting. Surveys will be conducted at the times of year when target species are both evident and identifiable. Based on the species with potential to occur, LSA anticipates that surveys in mid-spring (late April to early May), early summer (late June/early July), and late summer (August to September) may be required. If special-status plants are found in the survey area, the locations will be recorded using a GPS unit or equivalent. LSA will attempt to identify local, publicly accessible reference populations in conjunction with the focused plant surveys. The results of the surveys will be summarized in a technical memorandum which will include methods, a map of the survey area with locations of special-status plant species if found, photographs, and a list of all plant species detected.

Staff time estimates for this task are:

- Scenario 1: 105-acre parcel: 135 staff hours
- Scenario 2: 23-acre Phase 1: 65 staff hours

Task 5.3 Burrowing Owl Surveys

Burrowing owls (*Athene cunicularia*) became candidates for listing under CESA in 2024 and candidates are granted full protection under CESA. If suitable burrows are identified during the reconnaissance survey, LSA will conduct protocol breeding season surveys for burrowing owls in accordance with the Appendix D in the CDFW's *2012 Staff Report on Burrowing Owl Mitigation*. Four surveys will be conducted: one site visit between 15 February and 15 April, and a minimum of three survey visits, at least three weeks apart, between 15 April and 15 July, with at least one visit after 15 June. Given the limited amount of time remaining in the time period for the first survey, LSA will combine the first survey with the reconnaissance survey. The results of the surveys will be summarized in a technical memorandum which will include methods, photographs, and a map of the survey area with locations of suitable burrows and burrowing owls if detected.

Staff time estimates for this task are:

- Scenario 1: 105-acre parcel: 95 staff hours
- Scenario 2: 23-acre Phase 1: 65 staff hours

Task 5.4 Swainson's Hawk Surveys

Swainson's hawks (*Buteo swainsoni*) are listed as threatened under CESA and the CDFW considers the species sensitive to construction activities up to 0.5-mile from nests. LSA will conduct surveys in accordance with the Recommended Timing and Methodology for Swainson's Hawk Nesting Surveys

in California's Central Valley (Swainson's Hawk Technical Advisory Committee 2000). The surveys will cover the project footprint plus a 0.5-mile buffer and will be conducted by vehicle with spotting scopes on public access roads. Up to seven surveys to identify the location of nests and monitor their status will be conducted. The first survey typically occurs before April 5th. Given the timing of this proposal, the first survey will be conducted in conjunction with the reconnaissance survey, with the final survey occurring by June 10th. The results of the surveys will be summarized in a technical memorandum which will include methods, photographs, and a map of the survey area with locations of potential and occupied nests if detected.

Staff time estimates for this task are:

- Scenario 1: 105-acre parcel: 170 staff hours
- Scenario 2: 23-acre Phase 1: 165 staff hours

Task 5.5 Crotch's Bumble Bee Surveys

Crotch's bumble bee (*Bombus crotchii*) became a candidate under CESA in 2024 and candidates are granted full protection under CESA. The CDFW published its first iteration of a survey protocol for candidate bumble bees in 2023. Based on the requirements in this protocol, and the weather restrictions in particular, it would be infeasible to conduct surveys over the entire 105-acre property in one season. A phased approach with development of the parcel is recommended. Our cost for this task assumes survey of the 23-acre Phase 1 project. Three surveys of the 23-acre project site will be conducted, spaced at least 2-4 weeks apart during the Colony Active Period from April to August. The results of the surveys will be summarized in a technical memorandum which will include methods, photographs, a map of the survey area with Crotch's bumble bee observations, if detected.

Staff time estimates for this task are:

- Scenario 1: 105-acre parcel: not feasible
- Scenario 2: 23-acre Phase 1: 155 staff hours

Task 6. 2081 ITP Application

LSA will prepare an application for a 2081 ITP in accordance with Section 783.2 of the California Code of Regulations. Per the CDFW's guidelines, the application will include:

- Applicant contact information.
- The common and scientific names of the species to be covered by the permit and the species' status under CESA.
- A complete Project description of activities for which the permit is sought.

- The location where the Project activities are to occur.
- An analysis of whether and to what extent the Project activities, for which the permit is sought, could result in the taking of species to be covered by the permit.
- An analysis of the impacts of the proposed taking on the species.
- An analysis of whether issuance of the ITP would jeopardize the continued existence of a species. A complete, responsive jeopardy analysis shall include consideration of the species' capability to survive and reproduce, and any adverse impacts of the taking on those abilities considering:
 - Known population trends;
 - Known threats to the species; and
 - Reasonably foreseeable impacts on the species from other related projects and activities.
- Proposed measures to minimize and fully mitigate the impacts of potential Take of species and habitat.
- Draft a plan to monitor compliance with the minimization and mitigation measures and the
 effectiveness of those measures.
- A description of the funding sources and the level of funding available for implementation of the minimization and mitigation measures.
- Certification in the following language: I certify that the information submitted in this
 application is complete and accurate to the best of my knowledge and belief. I understand
 that any false statement herein may subject me to suspension or revocation of this permit
 and to civil and criminal penalties under the laws of the State of California.
- Documentation of CEQA compliance.

LSA will maintain communications with the CDFW throughout the permit application process, responding to questions as they come up. The budget assumes up to 20 hours of coordination time following submittal of the application, which includes up to two (2) virtual meetings with the CDFW plus additional email/phone communication as needed. Application fees will be provided by the applicant. We have assumed 68 hours of staff time for this task.

Task 7. USFWS Consultation

LSA will reach out to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service's (USFWS) Sacramento office to arrange for a meeting to discuss potential permitting requirements and options for federally listed species, including the San Joaquin kit fox that is known to occur in the area. We have assumed up to

10 hours for this task, which includes up to two (2) virtual meetings with the USFWS plus additional email/phone communication as needed. This task is applicable to all scenarios.

Task 8. Project Management

This task includes standard project management including team oversight, project tracking, scheduling of staff, invoicing, and routine communications throughout the duration of project. Phone calls and emails will be the routine method of communication.

Assumptions

- Taft College will provide a detailed project description for their current project, including a
 design plan set, an estimated construction schedule and list of construction equipment and
 materials.
- Taft College will complete CEQA documentation for the project. If Taft College would like
 assistance with preparation of CEQA documentation, LSA can provide a scope and fee.
- Reconnaissance survey will be conducted over the entire 105-acre parcel for inclusion in the BRE.
- The BRE will be drafted prior to completion of field surveys to support Taft College's preparation of CEQA documentation.
- Taft College will provide full access to the Project site.
- All draft and final reports/2081 application will be provided electronically.
- Our fee includes one round of compiled review and response to comments on each report and the 2081 application from Taft College on each draft report.
- Our fee includes up to two rounds of review and comment from the CDFW on the 2081 application.
- All permit application fees will be paid for by Taft College.

SCHEDULE AND BUDGET

Table A presents the cost for Scenarios 1 and 2, plus a third scenario in which species are assumed present and included in the 2081 ITP application without survey efforts. If the CDFW agrees, Scenario 3 may be the best approach given that preconstruction surveys for each of these species may be required for each phase.

Under Scenario 3, blunt-nosed leopard lizard surveys under Task 5.1 would still be required as no "take" of this species is allowable. LSA recommends surveying the entire parcel under each scenario to confirm the absence of the species in support of future proposed development.

Tasks 3, 4, and 6 would not differ among any scenario as evaluation of the entire 105-acre is recommended for CEQA compliance, and the 2081 ITP application process does not change based on parcel size.

Each scenario would be billed on a time and materials basis in accordance with our existing contract.

BP 4100 Graduation Requirements for Degrees and Certificates

BP 5500 Standards of Student Conduct

Reference:

Education Code Section 66300, 66301, and 76120; Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations §§ 51023.5 and 59300-59362; ACCJC Accreditation Standards 2

The Superintendent/President shall establish procedures for the imposition of discipline on students in accordance with the requirements for due process of the federal and state law and regulations.

The procedures shall clearly define the conduct that is subject to discipline, and shall identify potential disciplinary actions, including but not limited to the removal, suspension or expulsion of a student.

The Board of Trustees shall consider any recommendation from the Superintendent/President for expulsion. The Board shall consider an expulsion recommendation in closed session unless the student requests that the matter be considered in a public meeting. Final action by the Board on the expulsion shall be taken at a public meeting. The procedures shall be made widely available to students through the College catalog and other means.

The following conduct shall constitute good cause for discipline including but not limited to the removal, suspension or expulsion of a student, except for conduct that constitutes sexual harassment under Title IX, which shall be addressed under BP 3433 – Prohibition of Sexual Harassment Under Title IX:

Off-Campus Conduct:

Students may be subject to disciplinary action for off-campus conduct that constitutes a serious or violent criminal offense if such conduct poses a substantial threat to the safety, well-being, or educational environment of the college community.

Examples of Prohibited Off-Campus Conduct:

Violent crimes, sexual assault, sexual exploitation or other serious offenses that may impact campus safety or the welfare of community members.

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Due Process:

The District will follow due process for students facing disciplinary action as a result of off-campus conduct, as outlined in college administrative procedures, ensuring compliance with California Education Code and the Code of Regulations. This includes providing the student with notice, a fair hearing, and an opportunity to present evidence.

Campus-Related Conduct:

- 1. Causing, attempting to cause, or threatening to cause physical injury to another person.
- 2. Possession, sale or otherwise furnishing any firearm, knife, explosive or other dangerous object, including but not limited to any facsimile firearm, knife, or explosive, unless, in the case of possession of any object of this type, the student has obtained written permission to possess the item from a District employee, which is concurred in by the college President.
- 3. Unlawful possession, use, sale, offer to sell, or furnishing, or being under the influence of, any controlled substance listed in Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 11053) of Division 10 of the California Health and Safety Code, an alcoholic beverage, or an intoxicant of any kind; or unlawful possession of, or offering, arranging or negotiating the sale of any drug paraphernalia, as defined in California Health and Safety Code Section 11014.5.
- 4. Committing or attempting to commit robbery or extortion.
- 5. Causing or attempting to cause damage to District property or to private property on campus.
- 6. Stealing or attempting to steal District property or private property on campus, or knowingly receiving stolen District property or private property on campus.
- Willful or persistent smoking in any area where smoking has been prohibited by law or by regulation of the College or the District.

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- 8. Sexual assault or sexual exploitation regardless of the victim's affiliation with the District.
- 9. Committing sexual harassment as defined by law or by District policies and procedures.
- 10. Engaging in harassing or discriminatory behavior based on disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, or any other status protected by law.
- 11. Engaging in intimidation conduct or bullying against another student through words or actions, including direct physical contact; verbal assaults, such as teasing or name-calling; social isolation or manipulation; and cyberbullying, which is bullying conduct engaged in by electronic means.
- 12. Willful misconduct which results in injury or death to a student or to District personnel or which results in cutting, defacing, or other injury to any real or personal property owned by the District or on campus.
- 13. Disruptive behavior, willful disobedience, habitual profanity or vulgarity, or the open and persistent defiance of the authority of or persistent abuse of District personnel.
- 14. Cheating, plagiarism (including plagiarism in a student publication), or engaging in other academic dishonesty.
- 15. Dishonesty; forgery; alteration or misuse of District documents, records or identification; or knowingly furnishing false information to the District.
- 16. Unauthorized entry upon or use of District facilities.
- 17. Defeating any campus security measure, including tampering with locks, propping open locked doors or gates, or preventing a locked door or gate from securely closing.
- 18. Lewd, indecent or obscene conduct on District-owned or controlled property, or at District-sponsored or supervised functions.

- Enter a Mathematics baccalaureate degree program at a CSU with possible concentrations in Applied Mathematics, Economics, Statistics, Teaching Mathematics, and Theoretical Mathematics.

2. Catalog Description

The Associate in Science in Mathematics for Transfer 2.0 (AS-T) is designed to prepare students to transfer to a CSU as a junior with a degree in Mathematics. The core consists of the calculus sequence required for transfer, in which students acquire a conceptual understanding of the principles of differential and integral calculus for functions in one and several variables, as well as the ability to apply calculus techniques in a variety of applications.

Each group member would be participating in research, writing, rehearsal process and presentation of the group projects in front of a live audience in English.

Examples of Assignments and/or Activities:

Group research project and presentation: Students will work together in groups to discuss, write, and research a group project. For example, students could research a company that needs improvement and show what needs to be improved and why and how those proposed ideas could be utilized for the success of the company. They are writing an informative and persuasive research outline, paper and presentation. Based on the information and examples provided in class, students will prepare a formal outline for the group presentation, in which each student prepares and presents their assigned part for a 10 to 15 minute informative and persuasive oral presentation. The outline and paper include a minimum of 3 sources from reliable and credible sources such as books, articles, and academic journal articles with corresponding references using APA guidelines. The outline should be 2-3 pages long. The paper would consist of 3-5 pages.

As well as, conceptualizing and effectively using compelling arguments in support of a guiding thesis and organizational pattern appropriate for the audience, occasion, and across a variety of contexts.

Rehearsal of group presentation: Students will practice their individual parts of the group presentation in front of their groups in preparation for their presentation in front of the class.



Presentation of the group project: Group and Individual group members will present presentations in front of a live audience in English, which includes listening critically to provide constructive criticism to peers. And knowing and adhering to ethical communication practices which include truthfulness, accuracy, honesty, and reason as essential to the integrity of communication. As well as, demonstrating rhetorical sensitivity to diversity, equity, inclusion, belonging, and accessibility.

Students will critically analyze group presentations by evaluating their own presentation skills, the presentation skills of fellow group members and the presentation skills of other groups. The 3–4-page essay will analyze speech content, organization, and delivery. It will provide an assessment of the speaker's strengths and weaknesses and specific ideas for improvement.

Students will practice and refine the concepts presented in the course through a variety of well-prepared faculty-supervised, faculty-evaluated speeches delivered to a live audience (one to many) using effective delivery techniques and employing effective verbal and nonverbal practices while delivering a speech and managing communication apprehension.

GRANT AGREEMENT

THE TRUSTEES OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY

for Projects Sponsored by the California Academic Partnership Program (CAPP)

This Grant Agreement (hereinafter referred to as "Grant") is entered into by the Chancellor on behalf of **The Trustees of The California State University (CSU)**, (hereinafter referred to as "Grantor") in association with the administrators of the **California Academic Partnership Program** (hereinafter referred to as CAPP), and the **West Kern Community College District/Taft College**, (hereinafter referred to as "Grantee") for the project entitled "CAPP GPAP Augmented **Funding Project**". This grant shall be administered in accordance with **Attachment 1**, **Application/Statement of Work and Attachment 2 Proposed Budget FY 2024-2025**, and incorporated herein by reference.

Grantor and Grantee agree as follows:

- A. <u>TERM OF GRANT</u>: The term of this Grant shall be January 1, 2025 through August 31, 2025.
- B. <u>PROJECT KEY PERSONNEL</u>: The project director for the Grantee is Jaime Lopez. The Grantor project director is Zulmara Cline, CAPP Director.

C. FUNDING CONDITIONS

Upon execution of this Grant, the Grantor shall grant to Grantee an amount which shall not exceed \$30,000.00, in accordance with Attachment 2, Proposed Budget FY 2024-2025, subject to the terms and conditions as stated herein.

1. Funding:

Funding shall be provided for the period January 1, 2025 through August 31, 2025 subject to the appropriation of funds by the Legislature and approval by the Governor. Funding for current and subsequent fiscal years shall be subject to the following:

- a. Approval by the Legislature and Governor of necessary funding.
- b. Demonstration of adequate progress and fulfillment of all requirements of the Grant as described herein.

2. Payment:

Payment of 100%, \$30,000.00 will be issued upon full execution of the Grant by the Grantor and Grantee. Payment made under this Grant shall be subject to Paragraph F, Unspent Funds.

D. LIMITATIONS ON THE USE OF GRANT FUNDS

Grant funds shall be expended only for project purposes and activities set forth in this Grant (including Attachment 1, Application/Statement of Work) and Grantee's proposal as originally proposed or subsequently amended, consistent with the CAPP Legislation Education Code Section 11000 et seq., stats 1984, Ch.620 (AB 2398).

Proposed amendments to the project application/statement of work or budget shall be submitted in writing by the Grantee 30 days prior to request change for written approval by the Grantor. Grantor will respond to all requests in a timely manner. Changes requiring such approval may include, but not be limited to, the following:

- 1. Changes in the grant project director or other key professional personnel identified in Grantee's Proposal. Grantor shall specifically approve a change in the project director.
- 2. Substantive changes of project statement of work, purpose, or scheduled events detailed in the Grantee's proposal.
- 3. Changes in the project budget which exceed 20% in any budget category of each applicable year, or which introduce or eliminate types or categories of expenditures.
- 4. Changes requiring an increase or decrease in funding.
- 5. Changes in duration of the grant period.

Commitment of grant funds shall occur during the grant term. Such commitments shall relate to goods or services provided and used within the grant term.

E. <u>MISAPPLIED FUNDS</u>

In cases where funds are determined by the Grantor to have been misapplied by Grantee, Grantee agrees to repay all such funds to the Grantor.

F. <u>UNSPENT FUNDS</u>

If CAPP funds the project for subsequent fiscal year(s), unspent funds from the prior fiscal year may be carried forward to further the objectives of the project, with written approval from CAPP.

Any funds actually received by Grantee, which remain unspent at the termination of the grant period, shall be returned by check payable to The Trustees of The California State University at the time the final report is submitted.

G. COST PRINCIPLES

Only those costs set forth in the approved project budget are allowed. The following list of special items is not intended to be a comprehensive statement of all non-allowable costs. In the event of conflict between the principles below and any special provisions in the grant award letter, the stricter provision shall be applicable.

- 1. <u>Direct Costs</u>. Grant funds shall be expended only for direct costs that can be identified specifically in this grant with a high degree of accuracy.
- 2. Indirect Costs. Overhead charges are not allowed.
- 3. <u>Per Diem Reimbursements</u>. Costs shall not exceed the current rates allowed by Grantee's Travel Policies for travel undertaken by Grantee, or any sister of its sister campuses. CSU subawardees shall use the State Travel Policies.
- 4. <u>Travel Reimbursements</u>. Whenever possible, less than first class accommodations shall be used for air or rail travel. If first class accommodations are used, records shall contain a certification that less than first class accommodations were not available. When necessary, travel by other than the above modes may be authorized.

The maximum automobile mileage reimbursement rate is that currently authorized by Grantee's Travel Policies for travel undertaken by Grantee, or any sister of its sister campuses. CSU subawardees shall use the State Travel Policies.

5. Equipment and Capital Items. The purchase of capital items is expressly forbidden unless part of the approved grant proposal. Purchase cannot be made until approval from the CAPP office is granted. Capital items include land, and buildings. Equipment includes automotive equipment, office equipment, computers and related hardware, electronic equipment, etc. in which cost is equal to or greater than \$1,000.00 per item. Purchase of equipment may be allowed under exceptional circumstances. The purchase with grant funds of any equipment or capital item requires prior written approval by the Grantor's project director. Detailed justification for purchase of equipment must be provided in advance and must demonstrate how the equipment purchase is required to meet the goals of the grant.

H. GRANT ACCOUNTING AND RECORDS

Grantee shall maintain records and accounts consistent with generally accepted accounting principles and shall provide for such fiscal control and fund accounting procedures as are necessary to assure proper disbursement of and accounting for grant project funds. Expenditures and supporting documentation relating to this project shall be adequate to permit an accurate and expeditious audit. Accounting records shall be maintained in accordance with Section K. Audits.

Grantee agrees that the Grantor shall have the right to review, obtain, and copy all records pertaining to performance of the Grant, including financial records. Grantee agrees to provide the Grantor with any relevant information requested and shall permit the Grantor access to its premises, upon reasonable notice, during normal business hours for the purpose of interviewing employees, pre-funding visits to determine the adequacy of Grantee's accounting system, and inspecting and copying such books, records, accounts, and other material that may be relevant.

Grantee further agrees to maintain such records for a period of three (3) years after submission of the final financial report.

L. EVALUATION

Proposal for Taft College Summer Bridge Program

Project Title: Building Bridges to Success: A Summer Transition Program for Underserved Students

Project Summary:

This proposal requests funding for a five-day summer bridge program designed to support 30 graduating high school students transitioning to Taft College (TC). This program, "Building Bridges to Success," will take place the week immediately following high school graduation and aims to increase enrollment and retention rates among underserved student populations. The target participants are students identified through the Taft College Summit who fall into one or more of the following categories: English Learners (EL), students with disabilities, and male students with GPAs between 1.8 and 3.0 who were undecided about their post-high school plans prior to the summit. The program will provide academic preparation, college success skills development, career exploration, and community building activities to ensure a smooth and successful transition to college life. The program culminates in a celebratory trip.

Need Statement:

Data from the Taft College Summit indicates a significant need for additional support for students transitioning from high school to college, particularly among EL students, students with disabilities, and male students. These students often face unique challenges in navigating the college application process, understanding academic expectations, and accessing available resources. Many students within these groups, despite having GPAs demonstrating potential for success (1.8-3.0), express uncertainty about their future plans. This summer bridge program directly addresses this need by providing targeted support and resources to increase their likelihood of enrolling and succeeding at Taft College. A successful transition program can significantly impact retention rates and ultimately contribute to higher graduation rates.

Project Goals:

- 1. Increase Enrollment: Increase the enrollment rate of participating students at Taft College for the Fall semester following the program.
- 2. Enhance College Readiness: Equip students with essential college success skills, including time management, study strategies, note-taking, and resource utilization.

Background: California Education Code§ 42141 requires school districts to publicly disclose certain information that affects their financial status. Section 42141 specifically addresses workers' compensation funding for districts that are self-insured, either individually or as part of a joint powers agency (JPA). It also provides, in pertinent part, that the district superintendent shall annually provide information to the governing board regarding the estimated accrued but unfunded cost of workers' compensation claims.

West Kern Community College District is a member of Self-Insured Schools of California (SISC). An actuarial study was completed by Bickmore Actuarial of the projected financial standing of SISC on June 30, 2025. The actual financial position as of February 28, 2025, was \$58,640,508. The projected financial position on June 30, 2025, is \$64,946,000. These figures show that SISC has a positive ending financial position, and we are in full compliance with sufficient reserves.

Education Code 42141 requires school districts and county offices of education to publicly disclose certain information that affects their financial status. This legislation requires the following public disclosure:

If a district is self-insured for workers' compensation claims, either as an individual district or as a member of a joint powers agency, the district superintendent shall annually provide information to the governing board regarding the estimated accrued but unfunded cost of those claims. The estimate is to be based on an actuarial report obtained at least every three years. The information shall be presented by the superintendent at a public meeting of the governing board, and at that same meeting the board shall disclose, as a separate agenda item, whether or not it will reserve a sufficient amount of money in its budget to fund the present value of the accrued but unpaid workers' compensation claims or it is otherwise decreasing the amount in its workers' compensation reserve fund. The board will annually certify to the county superintendent the amount of money, if any, that is has decided to reserve in its budget for the cost of the benefits and/or the claims, and submit any necessary budget revisions to account for that reserve.

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RESIDENTIAL LEASE (Generic Lease Agreement)

THIS RESIDENTIAL LEASE ("Lease") dated as of July 01, 2025, is entered into between Taft College ("Tenant") and West Kern Community College District ("Landlord.").

NOW THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1. Lease

Tenant leases from Landlord the premises located at 108 Buchannan Street Taft, CA and consisting of a three-bedroom two bathroom and a detached single family home terms and conditions contained in this Lease (collectively, "Leased Premises").

Section 2. Term

The term of this Lease shall commence on July 01, 2025 and continue for a period of twelve (12) months.

Section 3. Deposit

Concurrent the execution of this Lease, Tenant shall deliver to Landlord a deposit in the amount of \$1,400.00 in the form of a District warrant, personal check, cashier's check, or cash ("Deposit"). The Deposit shall be held as security for the performance of Tenant's obligations under this Lease pursuant to Section 14.

Section 4. Rent

Rent shall be \$1,400.00 per month ("Monthly Rent"), payable in advance, on the first day of each calendar month to Landlord or Landlord's authorized agent, at the following address: 29 Cougar Court, Taft, CA 93268 or any other place designated by Landlord in writing. If Tenant takes possession of the Leased Premises on a date other than the first day of a calendar month, the rent payment for July 2025 through June 2026 shall be prorated in accordance with the then remaining number of days in the month prorated on the basis of a thirty-day month (Monthly Rent/30 = daily rent). Rent that equals the amount due for 12 months shall be paid over an 11-month period. You will receive August 2024 through June 2025 \$1,854.55 and no check in July 2025.

Section 5. Utilities, Services, and Yard Care

Tenant shall be responsible for securing accounts in Tenant's name for and the payment of all utilities and services to the Leased Premises, except yard care & water, which shall be paid by Landlord.

Section 6. Use and Subletting/Licensing

Landlord acknowledges that Tenant intends to use the Leased Premises as a part of Tenant's Transition to Independent Living ("TIL") program, which consists primarily of housing TIL program students in the Leased Premises as a private dwelling. The use of the Leased Premises will also include District staff and related parties regularly meeting with TIL program students in the Leased Premises as a component of the TIL program, and other TIL related activities. As a necessary component of the District's use of the Leased Premises, District intends to enter into subletting or licensing agreements with TIL program students ("Students") for the use and occupancy of the Leased Premises for TIL program purposes. Landlord unconditionally consents to such subletting or licensing of all or a portion of the Leased Premises, provided that such subletting or licensing shall not alter Tenant's responsibility for the obligations under this Lease.

Without Landlord's prior written consent, Tenant and Students may not use or maintain a waterbed on the Leased Premises. Tenant and Students may not repair any automobiles or any other motor vehicles, heavy machinery, or equipment, anywhere on the Leased Premises or in or around the building of which the Leased Premises are a part, including the parking area, garage, and driveway. Tenant and Students may not keep or maintain any pets on the Leased Premises without the prior written consent of Landlord, which Landlord may withhold in Landlord's sole discretion.

Section 7. Compliance with Law

Tenant shall comply with all laws, statutes, ordinances, and requirements of all city, county, state, and federal authorities now or later in force pertaining to the use of the Leased Premises, and shall require the same of the Students.

Section 8. Maintenance and Alterations

Except as set forth in this Lease, Tenant agrees that as of the delivery of possession the Leased Premises are in good working order and repair. Landlord shall, at Landlord's own expense and at all times, maintain the Leased Premises in good working order and repair, including all equipment, appliances, furniture, fixtures, and furnishings. Tenant shall be responsible for damages caused by Tenant's negligence and that of Tenant's family, invitees, subtenants, licensees, and guests. Tenant shall not paint, wallpaper, or otherwise make permanent alterations to the Leased Premises without the prior written consent of Landlord. Tenant shall not commit or allow any person to commit any act resulting in the destruction, defacement, damage, impairment, or removal of any part of the Leased Premises, including wall, ceiling, and floor coverings, and the furniture, fixtures, and furnishings of the Leased Premises. Tenant shall surrender the Leased Premises at termination of this Lease in as good condition as received, normal wear and tear excepted. Tenant shall require Students to comply with this Section.

Section 9. Entry

Landlord shall have the right to enter the Leased Premises for the purposes of making necessary or agreed repairs and for showing the Leased Premises to prospective tenants, purchasers, or mortgagees, provided that, except in the case of an emergency, such entry shall be made during normal business hours and upon at least thirty-six (36) hours' prior notice to Tenant. Tenant may not change the locks to the Leased Premises without the prior consent of Landlord.

Section 10. Indemnification

Landlord shall not be liable for any damage or injury to Tenant or any other person, or to any property, occurring on the Leased Premises or any part of the Leased Premises or in common areas, unless the damage is caused by the negligent, willful, or intentional act or omission to act of Landlord, Landlord's agents, or Landlord's employees. Tenant agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Landlord for any liability, costs (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for personal injuries or property damage that is the proximate result of the gross negligence or willful misconduct of Tenant or Tenant's guests or invitees. Each party waives the right of subrogation against the other party.

Section 11. Delay of Possession

Tenant may terminate this Lease if possession is not delivered within five (5) days of the commencement of the Term.

Section 12. Default and Time to Cure

If Tenant fails to pay rent when due, or to perform any term of this Lease, after not less than seven (7) days' written notice of default given to Tenant in the manner required by law, Landlord, at Landlord's option, may terminate all rights of Tenant under this Lease, unless Tenant, within the time specified, cures the default.

Section 13. Remedies

If Tenant defaults, Landlord may elect to:

(a) continue the lease in effect, and enforce all Landlord's rights and remedies under this Lease, including the right to recover the rent as it becomes due, or

(b) at any time, terminate all of Tenant's rights under this Lease, and recover from Tenant all damages Landlord may incur by reason of the breach of the lease, including the cost of recovering the Leased Premises and including the worth at the time of the termination or at the time of an award if suit is instituted to enforce this provision, of the amount by which the unpaid rent for the balance of the term exceeds the amount of the rental loss that Tenant proves could be reasonably voided.

In addition to any other rights and remedies allowed by this Lease or by law, Landlord shall have the remedies as set forth in Civil Code §§ 1951.2 and 1951.4.

Section 14. Security Deposit

Tenant is placing a Deposit with Landlord in the sum set forth in Section 3. Landlord shall not be obligated to pay interest on the Deposit. Landlord will hold the deposit for the full and timely performance by Tenant of Tenant's obligations under this Lease, including payment of rent and

cleaning, maintaining, and repairing the Leased Premises after surrender. If all or any portion of Tenant's security deposit is applied by Landlord during the term of this Lease, Landlord may demand that Tenant replenish the full amount applied. Tenant's failure to replenish the amount within seven (7) days after written demand will constitute a breach of this Lease. The balance of all deposits shall be refunded no later than twenty-one (21) calendar days from the date possession of the Leased Premises is delivered to Landlord or Landlord's agent, together with a statement showing any charges made against the deposits by Landlord.

Section 15. Waiver

No failure of Landlord to enforce any term of this Lease shall be deemed a waiver, nor shall any acceptance of a partial payment of rent be deemed a waiver of Landlord's right to the full amount of rent.

Section 16. Termination of Lease

This agreement continues from the commencement date as a month-to-month tenancy. Tenant may terminate the tenancy by giving written notice at least 30 days prior to the intended date. Tenant shall be responsible for paying rent through the termination date even if moving out early. Landlord may terminate the tenancy by giving written notice as provided by law. Such notices may be given on any date.

Section 17. Notices

Any notice that either party may or is required to give, may be given by mailing the notice, postage prepaid at the address shown below, or at any other place designated in writing by the parties from time to time.

Section 19. Time

Time is of the essence in this Lease.

Section 20. Holding Over

Any holding over after expiration of the Lease, with the consent of Landlord, shall be construed as a month-to-month tenancy in accordance with the terms of this Lease, as applicable. No holding over or extension of this Lease shall extend the time for the exercise of the option unless agreed upon in writing by Landlord.

Section 21. Late Charges

If Tenant fails to pay the Monthly Rent within five (5) days after the due date, Tenant agrees that it would be impracticable or extremely difficult to fix the actual damage to Landlord caused by that failure and therefore agrees to pay a late charge of \$35.00. The amounts due under this Section are in addition to and not in lieu of any other remedies of Landlord.

Section 22. Construction

Headings at the beginning of each section of this Lease are solely for the convenience of the parties and are not a part of and shall not be used to interpret this Lease. The singular form shall include plural, and vice versa. This Lease shall not be construed as if it had been prepared by one of the parties, but rather as if both parties have prepared it. Unless otherwise indicated, all references to sections are to this Lease.

Section 23. Further Assurances

MASTER SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made as of <u>May 15,2025</u> between Almy Educational Consulting LLC ("we" or "our") and Taft College ("you" or "your") (collectively as the "Parties" or each individually as "Party"). The Parties agree to the following:

1. The Services.

- a. **Engagement**. You are engaging us to perform services ("Services") on your behalf.

Improving and Increasing Corequisite Options for STEM Students

Taft College has worked to implement corequisites in accordance with state legislation about developmental education. In light of recent changes to implementation guidelines from the Chancellor's office regarding AB1705, Taft College wants to develop a precalculus corequisite as well as a corequisite for Calculus. Further, specific support is needed to ensure online offerings of these courses are successful.

Proposal for working together

Dr. Taylor Darwin, Almy Education (AE) Director of Program Delivery and Math Program Lead, will manage the project's timeline and additional consultants to support the work. Taylor will provide an abbreviated version of the AE evaluation to determine any additional needs related to advising beyond the curricular work on precalculus and calculus. The evaluation will not be lengthy nor duplicative of prior efforts made at the college since substantial work has already been done.

Taylor Darwin will provide support for the specific corequisite needs as well as the online delivery modality of the courses. Dr. April Strom will provide professional development and support for incorporating active learning strategies in the course.

Most of the work will be conducted between March and August 2025. Further support will be provided to the faculty teaching the courses in 2025 to help with the rollout and any associated issues. Outcomes data for Fall 2025 will be reviewed in December 2025 so that adjustments can be made and incorporated for the Spring 2026 semester.

In summary, the following activities will be conducted:

- Abbreviated evaluation to determine any related systems-level needs (advising, registration, etc.) that impact enrollment in precalculus and calculus
- Curricular alignment and improvement for precalculus and calculus
- Development of corequisite support for both courses

- 2. I am authorized to certify, and do certify, on behalf of Contractor that a drug free workplace will be provided by Contractor by doing all of the following:

(A). Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in Contractor's workplace and specifying actions which will be taken against employees for violation of the prohibition.

(B). Establishing a drug-free awareness program to inform employees about all of the following:

- (i). The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
- (ii). Contractor's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;

(iii). The availability of drug counseling, rehabilitation and employee-assistance programs; and

(iv). The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations;

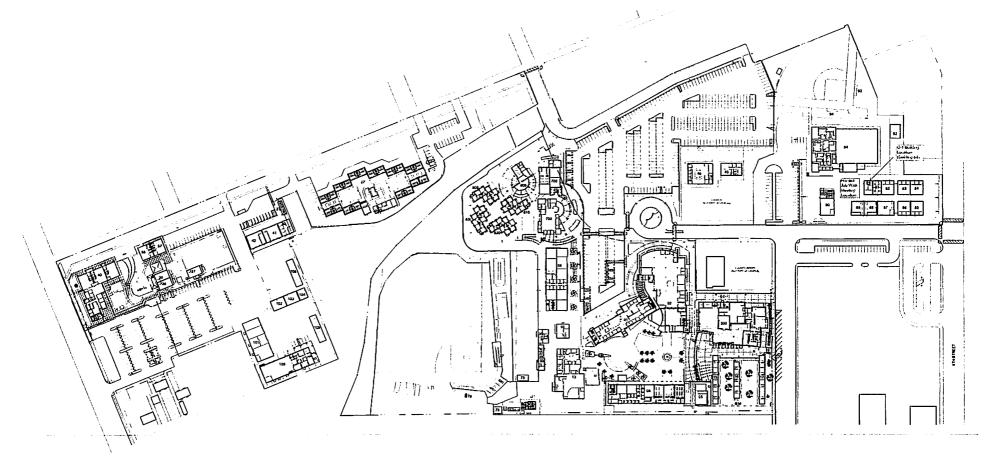
- 3. Requiring that each employee engaged in the performance of the Contract be given a copy of the statement required by subdivision (A), above, and that as a condition of employment by Contractor in connection with the Work of the Contract, the employee agrees to abide by the terms of the statement.
- 4. Contractor agrees to fulfill and discharge all of Contractor's obligations under the terms and requirements of California Government Code §8355 by, *inter alia*, publishing a statement notifying employees concerning: (i) the prohibition of any controlled substance in the workplace, (ii) establishing a drug-free awareness program, and (iii) requiring that each employee engaged in the performance of the Work of the Contract be given a copy of the statement required by California Government Code §8355(a) and requiring that the employee agree to abide by the terms of that statement.
- 5. Contractor and I understand that if the District determines that Contractor has either: (i) made a false certification herein, or (ii) violated this certification by failing to carry out and to implement the requirements of California Government Code §§8355, the Contract awarded

herein is subject to termination, suspension of payments, or both. Contractor and I further understand that, should Contractor violate the terms of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990, Contractor may be subject to debarment in accordance with the provisions of California Government Code §§8350, et seq.

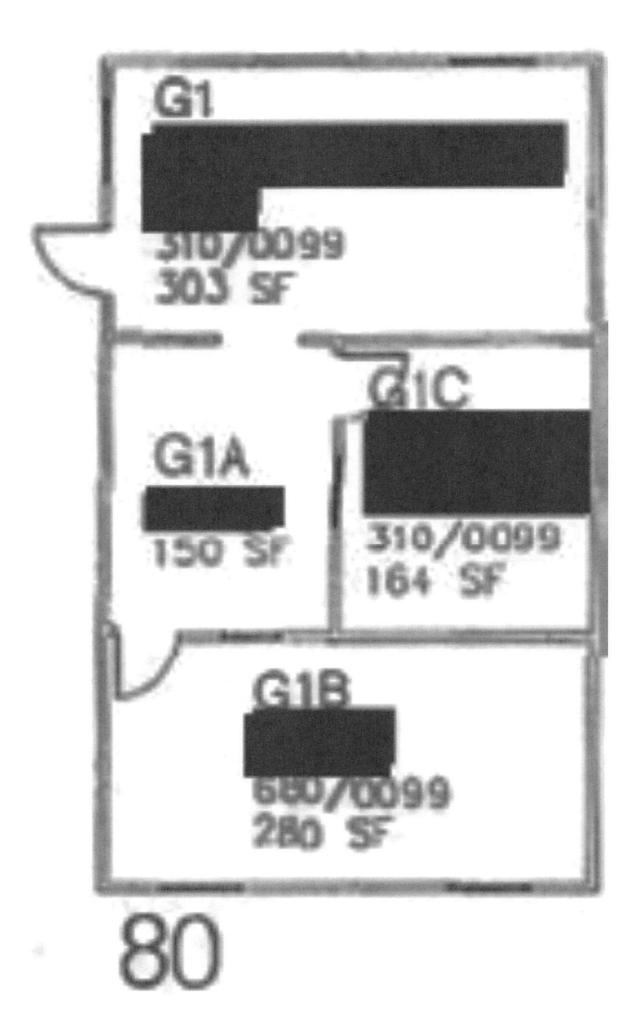

AGREEMENT FOR LEGAL SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is effective July 1, 2025 ("Effective Date"), between the WEST KERN COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT ("Client") and the law firm of LOZANO SMITH, LLP ("Attorney") (each a "Party" and collectively the "Parties"). Attorney shall provide legal services as requested by Client on the following terms and conditions:

1. ENGAGEMENT. Client hires Attorney on an as-requested basis as its legal counsel with respect to matters the Client refers to Attorney. When Client refers a matter to Attorney, Attorney shall confirm availability and ability to perform legal services regarding the matter. After Attorney has completed services for the specific matter referred by Client, then no continuing attorney-client relationship exists unless Client requests further services and Attorney accepts a new engagement. If Attorney undertakes to provide legal services to represent Client in such matters, Attorney shall keep Client informed of significant developments and respond to Client's inquiries regarding those matters. Client understands that Attorney cannot guarantee any particular results, including the costs and expenses of representation. Client agrees to be forthcoming with Attorney, to cooperate with Attorney in protecting Client's interests, to keep Attorney fully informed of developments material to Attorney's representation of client, and to abide by this Agreement. Client is hereby advised of the right to seek independent legal advice regarding this Agreement.

2. RATES TO BE CHARGED. Client agrees to pay Attorney for services rendered based on the attached rate schedule. Agreements for legal fees on other-than-an-hourly basis may be made by mutual agreement for special projects (including as set forth in future addenda to this Agreement).

3. REIMBURSEMENT. Client agrees to reimburse Attorney for actual and necessary expenses and costs incurred in the course of providing legal services to Client, including but not limited to expert, consultant, mediation, arbitration fees and e-discovery service fees. Attorney shall not be required to advance costs on behalf of Client over the amount of \$1,000 unless otherwise agreed to in writing by Attorney. Typical expenses advanced for Client, without prior authorization, include messenger fees, witness fees, expedited delivery charges, travel expenses, court reporter fees and transcript fees. Client authorizes Attorney to retain experts or consultants to perform services necessary to represent Client for a specific matter.

4. MONTHLY INVOICES. Attorney shall send Client a statement for fees and costs incurred every calendar month (the "Statement"). Statements shall set forth the amount, rate and description of services provided. Client shall pay Attorney's Statements within thirty (30) calendar days after receipt. An interest charge of one percent (1%) per month shall be assessed on balances that are more than thirty (30) calendar days past due, not to exceed 10% per annum.

5. COMMUNICATIONS BETWEEN ATTORNEY AND CLIENT. The Parties recognize that all legal advice provided by Attorney is protected by the Attorney-Client and Work Product

Privileges. In addition to regular telephone, mail and other common business communication methods, Client hereby authorizes Attorney to use facsimile transmissions, cellular telephone calls and text, unencrypted email, and other electronic transmissions in communicating with Client. Unless otherwise instructed by Client, any such communications may include confidential information.

6. POTENTIAL AND ACTUAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST. If Attorney becomes aware of any potential or actual conflict of interest between Client and one or more other clients represented by Attorney, Attorney will comply with applicable laws and rules of professional conduct.

7. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. Attorney is an independent contractor and not an employee of Client.

8. TERMINATION.

a. <u>Termination by Client</u>. Client may discharge Attorney at any time, with or without cause, by written notice to Attorney.

b. <u>Termination by Mutual Consent or by Attorney</u>. Attorney may terminate its services at any time with Client's consent or for good cause. Good cause exists if (a) Client fails to pay Attorney's Statement within sixty (60) calendar days of its date; (b) Client fails to comply with other terms and conditions of this Agreement, including Client's duty to cooperate with Attorney in protecting Client's interests; (c) Client has failed to disclose material facts to Attorney; or (d) any other circumstance exists that requires termination of this engagement under the ethical rules applicable to Attorney. Additionally, to the extent allowed by law, Attorney may decline to provide services on new matters or may terminate the Agreement without cause upon written notice to Client if Attorney is not then providing any legal services to Client. Even if this Agreement is not terminated, under paragraph 1, an attorney-client relationship exists only when Attorney is providing legal services to Client.

c. <u>Following Termination</u>. Upon termination by either Party: (i) Client shall promptly pay all unpaid fees and costs for services provided or costs incurred pursuant to this Agreement up to the date of termination; (ii) unless otherwise required by law or agreed to by the Parties, Attorney will provide no legal services following notice of termination; (iii) Client will cooperate with Attorney in facilitating the orderly transfer of any outstanding matters to new counsel, including promptly signing a substitution of counsel form at Attorney's request; and (iv) Client shall, upon request, be provided the Client's file documents maintained for the Client by Attorney and shall sign acknowledgment of receipt upon delivery of that file. For all Statements received by Client from Attorney prior to the date of termination, Client's failure to notify Attorney in writing of any disagreement with either the services performed or the charges for those services as shown in the Statement within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of termination shall be deemed Client's acceptance of and agreement with the Statement. For any billing appearing for the first time on a Statement received by Client from Attorney after the date of termination, failure to notify Attorney in writing of any disagreement with either the services performed or the charges for those services within thirty (30) calendar days from receipt of the Statement shall be deemed to signify Client's acceptance of and agreement with the Statement.

9. MAINTENANCE OF INSURANCE. Attorney agrees that, during the term of this Agreement, Attorney shall maintain commercial liability and professional errors and omissions insurance.

10. CONSULTANT SERVICES. Attorney works with professional consultants that provide services, including but not limited to, investigations, public relations, educational consulting, leadership mentoring and development, financial, budgeting, management auditing, board/superintendent/chancellor relations, administrator evaluation and best practices, and intergovernmental relations. Attorney does not share its legal fees with such consultants. Attorney may offer these services to Client upon request.

11. DISPUTE RESOLUTION.

Mediation. Except as otherwise set forth in this section, Client and Attorney a. agree to make a good faith effort to settle any dispute or claim that arises under this Agreement through discussions and negotiations and in compliance with applicable law. In the event of a claim or dispute, either Party may request, in writing to the other Party, to refer the dispute to mediation. This request shall be made within thirty (30) calendar days of the action giving rise to the dispute. Upon receipt of a request for mediation, both Parties shall make a good faith effort to select a mediator and complete the mediation process within sixty (60) calendar days. The mediator's fee shall be shared equally between Client and Attorney. Each Party shall bear its own attorney fees and costs. Whenever possible, any mediator selected shall have expertise in the area of the dispute and any selected mediator must be knowledgeable regarding the mediation process. No person shall serve as mediator in any dispute in which that person has any financial or personal interest in the outcome of the mediation. The mediator's recommendation for settlement, if any, is non-binding on the Parties. Mediation pursuant to this provision shall be private and confidential. Only the Parties and their representatives may attend any mediation session. Other persons may attend only with the written permission of both Parties. All persons who attend any mediation session shall be bound by the confidentiality requirements of California Evidence Code section 1115, et seq., and shall sign an agreement to that effect. Completion of mediation shall be a condition precedent to arbitration, unless the other Party refuses to cooperate in the setting of mediation.

b. <u>Dispute Regarding Fees</u>. Any dispute as to attorney fees and/or costs charged under this Agreement shall to the extent required by law be resolved under the California Mandatory Fee Arbitration Act (Bus. & Prof. Code §§ 6200, <u>et seq</u>.).

c. <u>Binding Arbitration</u>. Except as otherwise set forth in section (b) above, Client and Attorney agree to submit all disputes to final and binding arbitration, either

following mediation which fails to resolve all disputes or in lieu of mediation as may be agreed by the Parties in writing. Either Party may make a written request to the other for arbitration. If made in lieu of mediation, the request must be made within sixty (60) calendar days of the action giving rise to the dispute. If the request for arbitration is made following an unsuccessful attempt to mediate the Parties' disputes, the request must be made within ten (10) calendar days of termination of the mediation. The Parties shall make a good faith attempt to select an arbitrator and complete the arbitration within ninety (90) calendar days. If there is no agreement on an arbitrator, the Parties shall use the Judicial Arbitration and Mediation Service (JAMS). The arbitrator's qualifications must meet the criteria set forth above for a mediator, except, in addition, the arbitrator shall be an attorney or a retired judge, unless otherwise agreed by the Parties. The arbitrator's fee shall be shared equally by both Parties. Each Party shall bear its own attorney fees and other costs. The arbitrator shall render a written decision and provide it to both Parties. The arbitrator may award any remedy or relief otherwise available in court and the decision shall set forth the reasons for the award. The arbitrator shall not have any authority to amend or modify this agreement. Any arbitration conducted pursuant to this paragraph shall be governed by California Code of Civil Procedure sections 1281, et seq. By signing this Agreement, Client acknowledges that this agreement to arbitrate results in a waiver of Client's right to a court or jury trial for any fee dispute or malpractice claim. This also means that Client is giving up Client's right to discovery and appeal. If Client later refuses to submit to arbitration after agreeing to do so. Client may be ordered to arbitrate pursuant to the provisions of California law. Client acknowledges that before signing this Agreement and agreeing to binding arbitration, Client is entitled, and has been given a reasonable opportunity, to seek the advice of independent counsel.

d. <u>Effect of Termination</u>. The terms and conditions of this section shall survive the termination of the Agreement.

12. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement with its Professional Rate Schedule attached supersedes any and all other prior or contemporaneous oral or written agreements between the Parties. Each Party acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises or agreements have been made by any person which are not incorporated herein, and that any other agreements shall be void. Furthermore, any modification of this Agreement shall only be effective if in writing signed by the Parties.

13. SEVERABILITY. Should any provision of this Agreement be held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, but the remainder of the Agreement can be enforced without failure of material consideration to any Party, then this Agreement shall not be affected and it shall remain in full force and effect, unless amended or modified by mutual consent of the Parties; provided, however, that if the invalidity or unenforceability of any provision of this Agreement results in a material failure of consideration, then, to the extent allowed by law, the Party adversely affected thereby shall have the right in its sole discretion to terminate this Agreement upon providing written notice of such termination to the other Party.

14. NON-WAIVER. None of the provisions of this Agreement shall be considered waived by either Party unless such waiver is specified in writing.

15. NO THIRD PARTY RIGHTS. This Agreement shall not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party.

16. ASSIGNMENT. The terms and conditions of this Agreement may not be assigned to any third party. Neither Party may assign any right of recovery under or related to the Agreement to any third party.

17. EXECUTION IN COUNTERPARTS; SIGNATURES. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts with signatures appearing on separate signature pages. A copy, or an original, with all signatures appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement. Signatures transmitted by facsimile or electronic image shall be deemed original signatures and binding on the Parties.

WHEREFORE, the Parties hereto, by their signatures below, enter into this Agreement pursuant to the above terms and conditions as of the Effective Date.
